WHAT'S THE MYSTERY?

Who doesn't enjoy a good mystery? Many readers will be familiar with Agatha Christie, Edgar Allan Poe, and the Sherlock Holmes character, but there are also modern-day gems certain to captivate middle-grade readers.


In addition to being entertaining and intriguing, mystery is a genre that middle-grade readers need to be aware of and familiar with. Mysteries help reinforce critical thinking skills. They can be used to demonstrate the concepts of prediction, foreshadowing, and the importance of filtering and analyzing information.

A MYSTERIOUS CLASSROOM STUDY

- Prior to beginning your mystery unit, have the class discuss the genre in general terms. What is their definition of a mystery? Do they have any favorite mystery books, movies, or television programs? List their suggestions on the board. What are the shared common elements in their suggestions? What are the differences? Ensure that the discussion acknowledges the fact that not all mysteries have to involve a murder or violence.
- Review vocabulary words and concepts that are commonly found in mysteries, including: alibi, clue, deduction, evidence, hypotheses, motive, "red herring," sleuth, suspect, suspense, witness.
- Gather a collection of various mystery titles and have a cover discussion. Based on the cover's design—including artwork, typeface, and any featured blurbs or review quotes—have the students predict what the story or mystery will involve. Write their predictions on posterboard or summary sheets (one sheet per title). Store these predictions until the end of the unit, after the students have read a selection of the titles. Then compare their initial predictions with the actual storylines. How accurate were their guesses? Did they feel that the covers fairly depicted the text? Have each student select their favorite mystery title and create their own cover.
- For a creative writing exercise, compile a group of various images, including visuals from magazines and general vacation photographs. Have students pick an image and then, based on their chosen image, prepare an outline for their original mystery story. The outline should include the core mystery that needs to be solved, character and setting descriptions, and the series of events (plus clues) that will lead to the story's conclusion. Don't forget to remind them to add in a red herring or two, or an unexpected twist. Once outlines are completed, full stories can be written; these are then critiqued by both teacher and fellow students. Have students revise their stories based on the constructive feedback. The compiled stories can be printed and circulated to other classes or posted on the school's Web site.
