

Kindergarten Countdown Anna Jane Hays; illustrated by Linda Davick A little girl counts off the days by naming what she'll do in kindergarten.



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

Old magazines: safety scissors: glue sticks: crayons construction paper

- Let your child pick out her favorite letter of the alphabet.
- Go through old magazines and find that letter or things in the magazine that start with that letter.
- Make a collage by gluing the magazine cutouts onto construction paper.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

Construction paper: safety scissors: glue: crayons, markers, colored pencils: beads: glitter

- Help your child cut out a giant letter of the alpha-
- Decorate the letter with cravons or beads, or draw on the letter things that start with the letter. For example, draw some bananas on a B.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

Pipe cleaners: string: beads: safety scissors

- Give your child a pipe cleaner. String beads onto the pipe cleaner.
- Shape the beaded pipe cleaner into a letter of the alphabet, perhaps the letter of your child's first name.
- Cut a length of string and secure it to the beaded letter. Tie the ends of the string together to make a letter necklace.
